

Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque Prayer to the Sacred Heart:

Lord Jesus,

Let my heart never rest until it finds You, who are its Center, its Love, and its Happiness. Lectio Divina: The Spirit's Anointing and Our Mission (Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21)

Brothers and sisters in Christ, we gather today to prayerfully reflect on the opening verses of Luke's Gospel and Jesus's profound proclamation in the synagogue at Nazareth (Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21). These passages illuminate the origins of our faith and the mission to which we are all called as disciples of the Lord. Let us open our hearts to the guiding light of the Holy Spirit.

Meditation (Reading and Reflection):

Read Luke 1:1-4 and Luke 4:14-21 slowly and with reverence. Listen attentively to the words that stir your soul. What message is the Holy Spirit speaking to you through these sacred verses?

Invite these questions to rest in your heart:

- Luke diligently researched and compiled his Gospel, seeking accuracy and truth. How does his dedication inspire you in your own journey of faith and understanding of the sacred Scriptures?
- Jesus returns to Galilee "in the power of the Spirit." How does the Holy Spirit empower you to live as a faithful witness to Christ?
- Jesus reads from the prophet Isaiah, proclaiming "glad tidings to the poor,"
 "liberty to captives," and "recovery of sight to the blind." How do these
 words resonate within you? Who are the "poor," "captives," and "blind" in
 your life and in the world today who yearn for God's mercy and healing
 touch?
- Jesus declares that this Scripture "is fulfilled in your hearing." How is this Scripture fulfilled in your own life? How are you called to participate in fulfilling it for others, bringing Christ's light to those who dwell in darkness?

Contemplation:

- Choose a word or phrase from the passages that particularly touched your heart (e.g., "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me," "glad tidings," "fulfilled").
- Enter into a sacred silence, holding this word or phrase gently in your heart. Allow the Holy Spirit to illuminate its deeper meaning for you.
- Imagine yourself present in the synagogue in Nazareth, listening to Jesus read from the scroll of Isaiah. What do you see, hear, and feel in this holy space? How does His presence affect you?



As the words of Scripture echo in your heart, you might find yourself drawn to these paths of prayer and action:

- Lift your heart to God in prayer, seeking a greater awareness of the Holy Spirit's presence and guidance in your life.
- Ask our Blessed Mother Mary to intercede for you, that you may receive the grace to live out your baptismal call to share the Good News and bring Christ's love to the world.
- Offer a prayer for the courage to be a voice for the voiceless, a beacon of hope for those in need, and a true disciple of Christ in all that you do.
- Imagine the many ways you can be a bearer of "glad tidings" to the poor and marginalized in your community. This might involve volunteering at a local soup kitchen, donating to a charity, or simply offering a listening ear and a compassionate heart to someone in need.
- Take some time for quiet reflection, pondering the areas of your own life where you feel "captive" or "blind." How can you seek healing and freedom through Christ and His Church?
- Share the message of this Lectio Divina with someone else. Discuss how you can both live out Christ's mission in your daily lives, supporting one another on your journey of faith.

A Moment of Grace:

The Gospel of Luke reminds us that the Good News of Jesus Christ is a gift offered to all people. May we be inspired by the Holy Spirit to share this message of hope and salvation with the world, drawing all souls to the loving embrace of our Savior. Amen.

Since many have undertaken to compile a narrative of the events that have been fulfilled among us, just as those who were eyewitnesses from the beginning and ministers of the word have handed them down to us, I too have decided, after investigating everything accurately anew, to write it down in an orderly sequence for you, most excellent Theophilus, so that you may realize the certainty of the teachings you have received.

Jesus returned to Galilee in the power of the Spirit, and news of him spread throughout the whole region. He taught in their synagogues and was praised by all.

He came to Nazareth, where he had grown up, and went according to his custom into the synagogue on the sabbath day. He stood up to read and was handed a scroll of the prophet Isaiah. He unrolled the scroll and found the passage where it was written:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord."

Rolling up the scroll, he handed it back to the attendant and sat down, and the eyes of all in the synagogue looked intently at him. He said to them, "Today this scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing."
